Relevance of the active leisure sector and international qualification framework to the EQF





The current active leisure sector qualification framework has an "informal" referencing to EQF levels.

It is a "unitary" framework with no legal status and no direct connection to the EQF or NQFs.

Explicitly detailed in ESCO referencing and established in social dialogue, the SQF has been in development since 2009.




SPORT & ACTIVE LEISURE SECTOR

Extract from the current review of the EQF as part of the New Skills Agenda

"The growing internationalisation of products and services value chains has triggered an increasing number of international (sectoral) qualifications industry-based training and certifications, based on <u>standards developed</u> <u>by international companies or sectoral</u> <u>organisations ..."</u>





"The current Recommendation (of the EQF review) stipulates that international sectoral organisations should be able to relate their qualifications systems to a common European reference point and thus show the relationship between international sectoral qualifications and national qualifications systems.

However, the Recommendation did not create explicit provisions on how this direct relation to the EQF should be achieved."







Policy reform is led by DG EMPL

EuropeActive awarded an Erasmus+ project lasting for 2 years

In the context of Study prepared by ICF:
sectoral initiatives = 254
some high use of qualifications/standards
some agree relationship with NQFs
some already use EQF referencing
nearly all based on learning outcomes
most embed quality assurance processes





The three areas of action of the SIQAF project:

- 1. Propose how a sector/international qualification framework could be related to the EQF. This will include identifying the conditions and characteristics that will be needed by a sector considering referencing and its relevance of its qualifications and/or framework to the EQF. This also addresses the key issue of transferability.
- **2. Quantify and qualify the criteria required**, and the way that they would have to be applied to the process, and such that they will embed convincing and plausible quality assurance criteria.
- 3. Explain how a sectoral qualifications system/framework needs to **establish a body for the demonstration of good governance**, and to gain its validation from employers, employees, VET experts, accreditation bodies and other stakeholders in their sector.





Other big drivers of policy review and "harmonisation" at the European level:

Directive 2005/36 EC as amended by Directive 2013/55 EU – common training frameworks, test and professional card

European standards for fitness centres CEN/TC 136/WG 2 - recognition of "qualified" fitness trainer(s)

European Committee for Standardization







We will be replicating the first 8 steps of an NQF referencing to the EQF

We need wide consultation and understanding with Member States

The idea is to improve understanding, transparency and quality assurance of qualifications in the active leisure sector

We will form a "contact group" with MS experts to give guidance, context and opinion Nothing can go forward without the tacit understanding and approval of the MS
